

As a relatively new Case Manager to the Home and Community Care Program at Hutt St Centre, the story of Norm is inspiring and heartwarming.

Over the past 30 years Norm has been a client of HSC whilst remaining fiercely independent, active and a positive role model to others around him. I had been told of the previous attempts to encourage Norm to move from boarding house living to residential care but it seemed as though Norm was adamant

in continuing his daily routine of walking down to the Centre to enjoy two meals a day, have a cup of tea or play cards with some mates.

Norm's dedication as a kitchen volunteer in the 1970's serving morning tea is well known by staff and clients. Since those days Norm has become highly respected and admired by many.

Recently Norm's ill health has seen him hospitalised and out of action. Whilst it was terrible for Norm it has really highlighted the fact he may require some additional support. The challenge for Norm was to decide, with our support, about what journey he would take from here.

After some lengthy discussions that included dispelling some of the myths of residential care living, and a visit back to his boarding house room, Norm had a good, hard think about what was best for his health and quality of life and eventually came to the decision to move into residential care.

Norm has begun to see the positive side of moving such as the opportunity to meet new and like-minded people in a safe and secure environment. Needless to say, I have no doubt I'm speaking on behalf of all of us when I say that we have been so lucky to have Norm to cheerfully greet us every day. We are even happier that Norm is looking forward to the next step in his life and the opportunities it will bring.

Giving comfort to clients after loss

Sometimes it is important to take time to reflect on some of the difficult experiences we encounter here. Sadly, we recently experienced the loss of a young man in tragic circumstances. This loss was felt by clients, staff and volunteers alike and expressed in many ways. Some with tears, others quietly digesting the loss, and some with anger. There is no right or wrong answer on how to express loss – but for many of us, the importance of asking R U OK was amplified.

One of my privileged tasks as a pastoral care worker at Hutt St Centre is preparing memorial and funeral services for clients who have passed away. When I say privileged task it is because it's the last thing one can do for a person in this world. Consequently a lot of thought and preparation goes into these services. We are careful to prepare them in the way we feel the person who passed away would have liked and also how those who are grieving would feel their lost friend was best respected and honoured. The sadness and mourning here is often very raw and the loss impacts very deeply on other people who already feel vulnerable.

lan Cox visits homeless around the globe

After almost 21 years at Hutt St Centre overseeing so much growth and development of our services, the Daughters of Charity have sent our CEO Ian Cox on a journey to visit, research and learn from our counterparts overseas. From late September Ian will visit agencies in the USA including Search Homeless Services, Bread for the City and The Bridge Homeless Assistance Centre, then travel to the UK to The Passage, St Mungos, Huggard and Depaul International and then to Europe. Visits to the Mother House, a Day Centre and other services in Paris are included in Ian's itinerary.

While away Ian will keep us informed of the things that inspire, encourage and fascinate him in our industry. The learning's he gathers from agencies in other places will help guide his work and our direction into the future. Let's hope Ian can also share some of our innovative ideas and programs with others doing similar work. We wish Ian safe travels and look forward to his return in November.

The prayers and poems they offer during the service are very heartfelt and courageous.

Our constitution tell us, 'At the school of son of God, the Daughters of Charity learn that no type of distress should be foreign to them.... Multiple are the forms of poverty and multiple the forms of service.

I often think when faced with some of the situations that are part of our clients lives 'for the grace of God there go I.' When I think of what some of our clients suffer and what they go through it really amazes me how they cope and I stand in awe. I often wonder with what I have been given in life 'could I cope with what some of our clients have had to suffer?'

Most of all the pastoral care work is about keeping alive the flame lit by Vincent and Louise so many years ago so that all who walk through the doors of Hutt St Centre, especially people who suffer the loss of loved ones, will experience the support, warmth, and love that the needy people of Paris experienced so many years ago.
