

2026 promises to be a transformative year for Hutt St Centre and South Australia at large.

Homelessness in our State has reached a crisis point, and incremental change is no longer enough. The homelessness sector is under unprecedented pressure. A chronic shortage of affordable housing, combined with the ongoing cost-of-living crisis, is pushing more people into homelessness and trapping others there for longer.

Demand for services is at record levels; beds are full, and waitlists continue to grow. At the same time, extreme weather events are increasing the risk of serious harm and death for people forced to sleep rough.



Giving a glimmer of home this Christmas



Christmas is the hardest time of year for people experiencing homelessness — for them, it is a stark reminder of everything that is missing in their lives. For Felicity*, who spent years sleeping rough, Christmas evokes painful memories of everything she's lost.

"I don't celebrate Christmas. When I wasn't sleeping rough, I used to do breakfast, lunch and tea at my dad's place — cook and clean for the whole family. And now, I don't do anything."

Sadly, Felicity's story is, not uncommon.

"The first time I slept rough was in 1995, when I left my ex-husband. I had to leave home every six months because he would find me wherever I moved and slip death threats under my door."

Just recently, I was sleeping rough again because my lease ended, and the owners wanted to sell the place. I couldn't secure a place in time."

Christmas is meant to be a time of joy, but for people like Felicity, it can be lonely, painful, and distressing. Thanks to your generosity, Christmas Day at Hutt St Centre was filled with simple moments that mattered — a welcoming space, a hot breakfast to start the day, and a traditional Christmas lunch shared in comfort. It was a chance for people to pause, feel included, and enjoy the season with dignity and joy.

Felicity shares: "I came to Hutt St for lunch on Christmas Day. My friend said to me to come over here and sit, and there's people around — which is better than being on your own. I got a present in a box all wrapped up — it was really nice."

Every person who walked through our doors received a gift, made possible through the kindness of our corporate and community partners. From movie tickets and vouchers to thoughtfully packed bags of Christmas treats, these presents carried a powerful message: you are seen, you are valued, and you matter.

Rising temperatures drive surge in demand for support

As summer temperatures climb, Hutt St Centre is experiencing a significant surge in demand for support, with the New Year already bringing record-breaking numbers through our doors.

In the first two weeks of the year alone, we surpassed our previous daily attendance record twice. On Monday 19 January, 207 individuals accessed support through our Wellbeing Centre, following 203 people on Monday, 5 January. Each time, our dedicated staff and volunteers rose to the challenge, ensuring that every person who sought support received it.

This sharp increase reinforces that the cost-of-living and housing crises remain major and ongoing issues for our community. While winter is often recognised as the most dangerous time for people experiencing homelessness, Australian summers present equally serious — and often underestimated — health and safety risks.


Extreme heat places people without stable shelter at heightened risk of dehydration, heatstroke, and the worsening of mental illness and other health vulnerabilities. Limited access to shade, water, and cool environments, combined with higher rates of mental illness and other health conditions, means heatwaves can be life-threatening for those experiencing homelessness. These risks are further compounded by the financial and family pressures that often follow the festive period, driving increased demand for support early in the year.

As temperatures rise across the city, we are seeing a direct and corresponding increase in the number of people turning to Hutt St Centre for help.

In response, we step up our support during extreme heat days. Over the long weekend and through this week we have extended our opening hours so people can rest safely in air-conditioned spaces, access cold water, refreshments, and essential services, and escape the dangers of the heat. Our teams are prepared with water, ice blocks, and practical care — ensuring that when the temperature soars, there is a safe place to turn.
